Chi Heng Foundation: Project for Children Impacted by AIDS NEWSLETTER



Providing Education and Beyond...

Now in its third year of providing support to children affected by AIDS, Chi Heng has increased its sponsorship to over 2000 children spanning four provinces in China (Henan, Shangdong, Guangdong and Anhui). Chi Heng has nearly doubled the number of children it is sponsoring from 1200 last semester. In addition to increasing educational sponsorship, Chi Heng is now moving towards providing comprehensive services beyond education. These include:

- Vocational training We are looking for training opportunities for sponsored students to help them acquire job skills, in addition to an education. Several students have now been trained in Guangdong factories.
- Psychological care: A memory book project has been started to help children deal with the grief of losing their loved ones (see details on next page). CHF plans to hire and train counselors for schools and orphanages. Our Art Therapy program is also continuing.
- Summer programs: This summer, we hope

to host a camp and study tour program. The summer camp will focus on psychological development for our students, including self-esteem building and healing through group discussions. The study tour will take students to visit cities in China and witness life beyond their villages. We hope this will serve as a motivational tool for students to progress in their studies.

Material provision for HIV positive people: CHF
is providing blankets, clothes, food, and nutritional products to 250 children infected with
HIV. We are also supplying nutritional products to adults taking ARVs in order to enhance
their adherence under a Direct Observation
Therapy program co-developed by Chi Heng
Foundation and the local health authority.

Chi Heng Foundation Begins Initiatives in the U.S.

- CHF's work was recently selected by Give2Asia, an affiliate of the Asia Foundation, to be featured as an example of its sponsorship in Asia.
 CHF was extremely honored to be one of two groups selected among the numerous projects supported by Give2Asia to be shared with its friends and supporters. Chairperson Chung To spoke about CHF's projects with audiences in San Francisco and New York in October.

China Memory Book Project

Over the summer, Chi Heng Foundation launched a Memory Book Project, led by Swarthmore College student Bella Liu. Memory books are printed "activity booklets" to be in which children can explore, record and come to terms with their personal histories, emotions, and dreams.

The purpose of these books is to help children cope with loss, stigma and other hardships; in addition, they preserve memories for the children that might otherwise be lost in the tumult of AIDS. These books have been adopted by many AIDS stricken countries around the world, particularly in Africa. While they have traditionally been made for sick or dying parents, the China Memory Book Project is unique in that it is child-centered, letting the children themselves make the books.

1,500 copies of the original memory books will be printed and distributed to orphans and schools in Chi Heng Foundation's Central China operating areas. Thanks to Colour Max for subsidizing the printing and designing and to Popular Bookstore for providing each child with a pack of crayons!

Art Therapy helps students cope with loss

CHF provides materials for sponsored students to draw sketches and write essays about their hopes and dreams, as a form of therapy to help them cope with traumatic experiences. Below is an excerpt from one of these essays.

We all know what the word 'hope' means. Different people may have different understandings of the term and may have different hopes for themselves. My hope is to become a doctor, to save the many people who are facing death. Whenever I talk about my hope my eyes fill with tears. My father died of that incurable disease. Whenever I think of AIDS I hate it to death. I hate it because it has taken away the lives of my Dad and many other young people. AIDS is as cruel as a heartless person. It is a pity that current medical technology can't save those who should be saved. After my father passed away, our family was in very difficult position. I could not afford to go to school. Uncle To then helped me go back to school. I don't have much to express my

gratitude to him. I can only study hard and become a doctor and save people's lives, so as not to let him down. I know that once the hope is set, I should strive ahead, and consider it as my life-long mission.
